# Lisa's Report of the CFA Annual Mtg.

Report from the Annual Meeting of the California Forestry Association (CFA)

The 2010 annual meeting for CFA was held in Sacramento on February 24-26<sup>th</sup>. The meeting started with a full day symposium on Carbon including carbon marketers, certification companies and discussions on the protocols in California. This was a highly technical set of discussions to get resource professionals up-to-date information on this emerging market.

That evening CFA hosted their annual legislative reception in conjunction with the Lumber Association of California and Nevada and the California labor group that worked with them to pass AB1066 this past session. The reception was well attended, with several legislators and staffers and presented the industry as a large and vocal force at the Capitol.

Thursday was a set of round table discussions on public land issues and the forest practice rules, presented by personnel from a myriad of state and federal agencies. Each presenter gave a short update on their agencies highlights from the year, changes and organizational challenges and then those in attendance were allowed to ask specific questions. Agencies represented included: US Forest Service, Cal Fire, Regional Water Boards, California Fish and Game, Sierra Nevada Conservancy and many more. I also attended the CFA business meeting with updates on their legislative, communication and legal work. It was amazing how much the staff has been able to accomplish with such limited resources. The lunch speakers were Senate Minority Leader Dennis Hollingsworth and the USDA Under-Secretary of Natural Resources and the Environment, Jay Jensen. During the awards dinner that evening Assembly Member Tony Mendoza was presented with the Legislator of the Year, and Mike Albrecht of Sierra Resource Management, and the past president of TuCARE was presented with the Communicator of the Year award. Well-deserved recognition in both cases.

The meeting concluded with a breakfast Friday morning that highlighted a speaker from the California Target Book about the 2010 legislative session and elections. Congratulations to the CFA staff and board of directors for a highly informative meeting and keep up the good work!

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## NEW BY-LAW CHANGE

APRIL 10, 2010

Page 9, Article 5 CWIT OFFICERS, Section 5.03

***“The President, 1<sup>st</sup> Vice President, 2<sup>nd</sup> Vice President, Secretary and Treasurer shall be elected annually by the Board of Directors at the annual meeting of the general membership. Election of officers shall be by secret ballot. Each officer shall hold the office until the member resigns or is removed or is otherwise disqualified to serve, or a successor shall be elected and qualified, whichever occurs first.”***

### **Arbor Day is a time for a conservation offensive**

The North Coast deserves a thriving economy that celebrates our magnificent natural resources, rewards innovation and supports communities with family-wage jobs.

Despite incessant calls for greater diversity in our economy, no business sector has stepped up to drive an economic revival. Ecotourism has yet to be a significant economic factor in our economy.

Perhaps Arbor Day, with its focus on conservation and planting trees, will shift attention to an often overlooked path toward economic stability.

Conservation is the key. It leads to sustainability and the wise use of resources.

Conservation is also vastly different from preservation.

For decades, efforts to preserve North Coast forests have reduced active forest management, made forests increasingly off-limits and brought the forestry industry to its knees. From 1988 to 2008 harvest levels on public forests in the state plummeted 95 percent, hundreds of jobs have been lost, and 40 percent of the California's sawmills have closed since 2000. North Coast unemployment now hovers near 12 percent with few predictions for imminent improvement.

Preservation ignores the fact that it is literally impossible to preserve dynamic forest ecosystems in a static state. It fails to consider that people have been a natural part of forested landscapes for thousands of years or that we have a responsibility to manage natural resources for the benefit of current and future generations.

Whereas preservation makes us passive observers of change, conservation lets land managers take an active hand in our forests' future.

California's North Coast has emerged as a hotspot for sustainable forestry. More has been done to advance science and technology in the woods in our own backyard than perhaps any region of the world. More spotted owls live on California's actively managed private forestlands than on public forestlands left to nature. Our area has invested more money in watershed restoration and salmon research on actively managed private forest and ranchlands

than anywhere else.

Imagine if local forestry were actually supported. Maybe California wouldn't import 75 percent of its lumber. We could sequester more carbon in healthy forests and tap tremendous potential to produce bioenergy and replace fossil fuels. We could enhance biodiversity and put communities back to work taking care of the forests that have sustained North Coast livelihoods for generations.

But instead, preservationist policies restrict forest management and limit investment opportunities. Tax incentives pay twice the dividend for renewable wind and solar energy than they do for renewable biomass energy. Regulatory costs to forestry companies and taxpayers alike have skyrocketed even though the harvest levels have dropped dramatically.

We're all for diversifying the local economy. But encouraging an existing, job-producing, sustainable business sector is more cost effective than trying the lure new ones that may or may not bring the family-wage job forestry provides.

The forestry companies that have survived perform to the highest environmental standards in the nation. While research shows that California law sets among the most stringent regulations anywhere, most North Coast forestland owners have taken the additional step of being certified sustainable by the Forest Stewardship Council or Sustainable Forestry Initiative.

The "locally grown" movement has inspired people to re-think their food consumption habits and support local food producers. It should cause us to re-think forests, too. As Dr. Keith Gilles, UC-Berkeley dean of the College of Natural Resources notes "the arguments to promote local food are no more or less valid when considering one's consumption of forest products."

It's time to choose conservation over preservation, to actively shape our forests and rebuild our economy by supporting working forest landscapes that provide perpetual employment opportunities. Support locally grown. North Coast forests just might drive an economic recovery.

## Seventy Two Years and Going Strong- The Redwood Region Logging Conference

The Redwood Region Logging Conference kicked off its 72<sup>nd</sup> annual conference under cloudy skies at the Redwood Empire Fairgrounds in Ukiah on Thursday, March 25<sup>th</sup>, 2010. Fortunately the scattered showers did little to dampen the enthusiasm of over 1000 elementary school students and teachers who would spend the day with industry professionals filling the role of tour guides learning not only about the forest products industry, but gaining an important connection with the men and women who are today's professionals.

"Education Day" as it is known, provides many of these students with the only opportunity to come face to face with the people and programs of today's resource industries, and always provides an opportunity for the tour guides to learn a thing or two themselves, often at the point of a surprisingly sophisticated question. By early afternoon the skies had cleared, little legs were tired, and the smiles of the students and instructors told the tale of a day very well spent.

The Redwood Region Logging Conference is a North Coast based nonprofit that holds the distinction of being the oldest continuously operating logging and forestry based conference in the Western United States. The conference is focused on education, both directed to industry professionals, and the general public, and works to develop programs that enhance the knowledge levels of both students and community members.

A day at the conference will find a broad range of individuals checking up on the newest equipment and technology, attending a variety of continuing education classes sponsored by the Associated California Loggers, and finishing the day with an evening wine and beer tasting social event complete with a great barbecue of beef and fresh Humboldt Bay oysters.

The Conference is especially proud of the relationship that has been developed with the North Coast Chapter of Women in Timber, and the two organizations work closely to provide effective education programs in the classroom, in the woods, and through annual scholarships.

With the backdrop of a tough economic framework, the Conference Board worked tirelessly to develop the programs, secure the resources, and seek the volunteers and sponsorships that would produce a successful event. Current president Tony Galletti was nervous, but confident that the organization could produce a quality event, and his confidence was born out by a historic level of direct sponsorships, high levels of attendance by both students and the community, and a full range of activities including an High School Forestry competition. "The community was great, the industry support level was great, and the Board worked like crazy, but in the end it was sure worth it" summarized Galletti with a smile that finally acknowledged that all the effort had been rewarded.

### Timber Legislation

Assemblyman Wes Chesbro has introduced **AB 2575**. We need to keep our eye on this bill. Called the "Comprehensive Forest Land Recovery and Restoration Act" it would create a framework for evaluating cumulative effects caused by industrial logging operations on privately owned timberlands. It would require CalFire to electronically publish timber harvest plans on a watershed basis.
